Dear Mr. Weiss:

I am in receipt of your cease and desist letter dated June 23, 2014. Our company takes your allegations seriously and, as such, we are in the process of investigating them, and consulting with legal counsel.


Meanwhile, please allow me to note that your letter seems premised on a fundamentally incorrect assumption: that our application purports to allow users "to buy and sell" parking spaces. That is not the case. MonkeyParking is an innovative social sharing application that lets registered users communicate with each other and share information when a parking spot is to become available. We are not in the business of selling or auctioning parking spots.

The shared economy trades on information, not on goods or services or other commodities. We are very surprised that the City of San Francisco, which prides itself of being a liberal, innovative and tolerating city, is taking a position that appears to be contrary to the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

So, please consider retracting your letter. We are receiving a lot of media attention and would like to resolve this matter without controversy. Please feel free to give me a call if you wish to discuss the above and better understand how our service works. Thank you.
